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OEF AT "FAMILIES BELONG TOGETHER" RALLY - TROY, MISSOURI

On June 30, 2018 two groups from the OEF Chapter went to the "Families Belong Together" Rallies, one group to the downtown St. Louis rally and the other to the Clinton County Missouri incarceration facility which is now being used by ICE. Others who were at risk because of the heat or had mobility issues provided backup prayer support at the retreat center. The rallies were part of a nationwide protest over the separation of children from their families at the Mexico/US border by the Trump "regime."

I was in the ICE detention center OEF protester group. After listening to a former police officer talk about the political patronage involved in the placement of ICE detainees in detention centers in remote locations, an organizer asked for volunteers to go a few hundred yards to Missouri Rte 61, a 4-lane highway, with our signs and chants. I was among the first dozen, but we were soon joined by about 100 more protesters. With that many people, the organizer soon began yelling "Shut it Down!," referring to Rte 61. As the crowd began to block the roadway, I told the organizer that when the police arrived, I would kneel in the roadway and pray. I showed him my Crown Rosary and we laughed that the Rosary probably had superstitious intimidation power even, and maybe especially, in Clinton County Missouri.

When two Clinton County Sheriff Deputies walked past toward the main body of the protesters blocking the highway, I put my sign on the pavement and knelt down and began to pray the 7 decades of the Franciscan Crown Rosary out loud. I was soon joined by a Sister of Mercy and a Mercy Associate. A large transport truck stopped, blocking the lane next to the median, and the driver got out and was speaking supportively to the protesters. As we started the fourth decade of the rosary, the Missouri Troopers began to arrive. I counted 27 Trooper cars. We were a few hundred feet from the main body of the protesters, but there seemed to be somewhat of a circus as the Troopers tried to find the truck driver in the middle of the crowd of protesters.

They were finally successful and the truck left. As we were praying the last decade of the Rosary, we were greeted with cheers and air horns from the trucker.

The Deputies and Troopers were polite and professional, no nightsticks, no arrests. I guess these officers don't like being associated with children in cages. They allowed enough time for many pictures. The Sister of Mercy and I were photographed many times, even by the Missouri State Police! The protesters were dispersing peacefully as I put my Rosary away and picked up my sign.

Even in 2018, in Troy, Missouri, a little bit of Franciscan prayerful foolishness expressing the hope in the foolishness of God, was given respectful notice.

- 4. What little thing am I doing that is particularly interesting? It is a slow process, but I do spend a lot of time thinking about how to re-write the "Noah's Ark" story for the 21st Century, imagining us on the pre-flood side of the story, looking into a future of devastating species extinctions and human tragedy as climate change plays itself out.
- 5. What do I need prayers for (a.k.a. why am I not with the good people gathered in St Louis this weekend?) As I continue my transition out of academia and into the nonprofit realm of doing good in the world, I am working three-quarters time as a nonprofit bookkeeper while going to school three-quarters time (fully online) for a Certificate in Accounting. Pray that I still, somehow, find time to sit on the porch in the evenings, sipping red wine, and reading novels.

Then there was Br. Michael and new postulant Sara performing to the tune of "Song Sung Blue:"



Joint Committee on Franciscan Unity



Since its inception in February of 2004, the Joint Committee on Franciscan Unity has believed:

"For the sake of creation, we are called to bear witness to the essential unity of the church, the Body of Christ, by working towards Franciscan Unity in all of its expressions. We will achieve this through dialogue and collaboration among the Orders which follow Christ in the tradition of Francis and Clare."

Mini conferences are held every year centering around current issues such as inclusivity among religions and cultures, Pope Francis' encyclical "Laudato si" on how we are called as Franciscans to respond to our environments in healthier ways, and this year's theme "Agents of Peace in a Time of Fear" addressing nonviolent ways to address the violent and insensitive times we live in.

The Joint Committee consists of two members from each participating Order, of which includes TSSF, OFS, OEF, and OLF.

In August of last year, the Joint Committee gathered for our annual meeting in Manhattan, NY. The highlights of our time together were:

- 1. The Lutheran Franciscans (OLF) coming on board with us.
- 2. Brs. Louis and Elijah became the Co-Coveners of the Joint Committee since OEF was the next in line for leading.
- 3. We completed a video production centered on religious formation and the work of the Joint Committee. The music was gifted to us by our illustrious Br. Louis who was

- 4. This past May, the Joint Committee held their annual mini conference at the Roslyn Center in Richmond VA, as Sr. Markie mentioned to us at Chapter. The title was "Agents of Peace in a Time of Fear" and was facilitated by Rev. Masud, TSSF and his presenting partner Rhett Engulfing from OFS.
- 5. The Committee is slated once again to meet this August for our annual meeting in Detroit, MI to decide what our next step(s) shall be.

The Committee wishes to thank you deeply for your continued support and we continue to pray and serve our respective Orders and the strength of Franciscan light throughout the world.

PLUS we have completed our 1st experiment with an on-line Fellowship that knows no geographical boundaries, but does have to deal with time-zone differences. Thus, though some Members of the Order (Professed and Novices), and some Postulants and Inquirers are quite geographically isolated, there truly is OEF Fellowship opportunities for everyone.

And none of us are limited to participation in one Fellowship. Fellowship gatherings are intended to be open-invitation events to gather with a Core of Members who are geographically close to one another. The Core will take responsibility for deciding the when and where of their next Regional Fellowship, shaping the event & assigning roles, and advertising the event as widely or narrowly as they decide, with the Chat List and Website and Fiddlesticks available to them along with social networks. Invitations may include local TSSF, OLF and OFS colleagues.

As might be expected, some of our Fellowships are, at any given time, "strong and regular" or "working to cohere" or "in process of forming". Your participation adds strength to the Fellowship(s) you choose to attend. The Fellowships Coordination Team will support your participation as much as we're able. Fiddlesticks Book Review

I am proposing a new regular column for the newsletter, a book review in which folks write a brief description of a book and share why it is meaningful/helpful to the writer. I'm kicking things off with a brief review of **Open Mind, Open Heart-by Father Thomas Keating.**

This small paperback (190 pages) was first published in 1986, then a 20th anniversary edition came out in 2006. It is published by Bloomsbury Press (www.bloomsbury.com) and available at most popular book sources like Amazon and Barnes & Noble. In it, Father Keating outlines the fundamental principles of what he describes as Centering Prayer, the usual initial step into more contemplative prayer styles. He opens the volume with a "Prayer to the Holy Spirit", a paraphrase of the ancient Latin hymn. Each chapter that follows takes the reader step by step into the practice of Centering Prayer, the style of prayer focused on learning the first language of God: Silence. He bases the teaching on understanding Jesus' teaching about prayer as recorded in Matthew 6:6-"If you want to pray, go into your inner room, close the door and pray to your Father in secret, and your Father who sees in secret will reward you."

This style of prayer is all about entering into the presence of the Spirit and resting there, to be silent and simply allow God to act in us. It is similar to Zen meditation but is not about emptying the mind in order to experience nothingness. It is about listening, about simply being with our Heavenly Father. It is an avenue for discovery. There is good psychology behind this way of praying as well. As one practices this way, things do start to happen. I have found this way revolutionizing on many levels. Self-awareness, healing, self-forgiveness, nurturing of the characteristics of Christ (or the 'fruit' of the Holy Spirit as described in Galatians 5:22,23) and more and more a sense of union with Christ.

I encourage folks to read and practice Centering Prayer. Attend a workshop with other interested folks. Meet with a Centering Prayer group. The book contains contacts and resources for one to

learn and practice this life-changing prayer. I have

never felt a deeper sense of God's love that heals, liberates and transforms my life, unifying it all in God's love.

*And speaking of books:

So, dear Sisters and Brothers, how many of us knew Brother Pacificus has written "an action thriller" that centers on the role of belief with a Professor of World Religions at the center of the action? He and his family are safe amidst floods and landslides in western Japan, and from an earthquake just off the eastern coast.



OEF in a Shoebox - Treasurer's Report

At the end of 2006, OEF's financial records consisted of \$4,055 in the bank and a shoebox full of receipts. In the succeeding years, faithful giving and careful stewardship have enhanced the financial sustainability of our little Order. By the end of 2016, we had \$21,648 in the bank. (And we retired the shoebox of receipts in favor of actual accounting software.)



How much is enough? We probably should have enough in the bank to pay for a full year's Chapter/Convocation, without chapter registrations. Why? Because if we ever had to cancel our annual gathering (for political or other reasons), we would still be liable for the contract we'd signed. Other than that, continued financial health will allow us to keep registration fees stable for our annual gatherings.
